General Public Comment

Joseph Hendee commented on the Round Up Program at the Board of Public Utilities. He stated that customers are automatically enrolled in the program. There should be a checkbox to say if you wanted to contribute and round up or not to help those in need through the Community Action Agency. It's a good program but has an issue of how it is implemented.

Dennis Wainscott mentioned that he is having trouble with his Board of Public Utilities accounts. Stated that his check go into the wrong accounts as he has a few he pays on. The Checks should be looked at specifically the "memo" portion to see which account it needs to be credited to.

Jack McLain commented that there is a conflict with some council members and Lance Lashaway. He is a business owner and renting the building to the Hope House. He stated that last week a council member stated he volunteers. Mr. McLain didn't know how you could volunteer and get paid.

Ted Jansen commented that he ran the 4th of July Parade for four years and one year a previous Mayor cleaned up the horse excrement's. Good opportunity for anyone running for office. He mentioned about brush pick up and said that DPS didn't pick up a pile. The Hope House has a stigma, that it's evil or bad, which is unfortunate.

Karla Adams commented on the Round Up Program at the Board of Public Utilities. She believes there needs to be a checkbox whether or not someone wants to contribute to the program.

Robert Eichler commented that people should have a choice whether or not someone wants to

contribute to the Round Up Program at BPU. Mr. Eichler stated he say the Police video and stated that it was not good and doesn't see the professionalism that the police should have at most times.

Doug Ingles, County Commissioner, reported the state revenues for Marijuana sales that were collected for 2021. The local distribution for Hillsdale County was \$282,000.00.

Eliana Hambleton commented on the Hope House and suggests that the community help them find a location and support them as it takes a lot of courage to ask for help. Ms. Hambleton commented on the Autism Awareness Proclamation as she is on the autistic spectrum. The proclamation stated that 1 in 44 people are on the spectrum, she mentioned that maybe some of the men at the Hope House are autistic as it is not uncommon for autistic people are more susceptible to drugs. Moving the problem doesn't mean it is solve but it is only displaced.

David Hambleton commented that he as a parent of seven autistic children he thanked the Mayor for the proclamation. He stated that there is a rift between the college and the people. He stated that we can do better and work together. He thanked the police chief for his service. Find solutions and build bridges, we can do better.

Penny Swan commented that Hillsdale is not as safe as it used to be. People can't blame the Hope House for the crime in the community. She thought that a committee to help brainstorm on solutions may be something to look at.

City Manager's Report

Manager Mackie shared April 14th at 6:00 p.m. is the Community Development Committee meeting at the Mitchell Research Building.

The Uran Street project received favorable bids which were under budget. Contract will be approved through State agency that provided the grant.

Brush collection stated today and next Monday will start leaf collection.

Audio/Visual bids for Council Chambers are being worked on.

Council Comments

Council Member Morrisey asked about the Round Up Program and what Board needs to discuss it.

Mayor Stockford stated that she spoke with a resident about her family grave was being desiccated and isn't happy and asked about cameras or something that can be done.

Council Member Socha apologized for interrupting Mr. McLain during Public Comment. He stated that he didn't appreciate his slams as he is on Council to do the best for the City. He is not against the Hope House but the location is not correct for Hillsdale. A location was offered and refused. He stated it's not okay to have a grandmother say it isn't safe to walk her grandchild to the Farmer's Market. Socha expressed strong feelings on the police incident and stated he is for the police and commended and appreciates each one of the City's Police officers.

Council Member Briner stated that the Public Safety meeting was earlier today and there are 200 openings in the state with law enforcement and police. City has gone from double digit applications down to 0. As the chair of the Public Safety Committee he supports the police and how they handled the recent situation.

- I. Call to Order: President Bowen called the meeting to order at 6:01 PM.
- II. Roll Call: Present Jim Bowen (President), George Allen, Scott Cress (Acting Secretary), Josh Paladino, Bryonna Barton (Director), David Mackie (City Manager), Jack McClain (Community Member); Absent - Karen Hill (participating online)
- III. Approval of Agenda: Allen moved approval. Paladino seconded. Unanimous approval.
- IV. Approval of Minutes: Allen moved the approval of the February minutes. Paladino seconded. Unanimous approval.
- V. Visitor Comments: McClain asked questions or made comments about the following items:
 - Hillsdale Township's agreement with the library
 - The use of the Michigan HOPE Grant to fund staff stipends
 - The process of posting meeting agendas and minutes
- VI. Financial Report: Under Income, it was reported that \$5213 was received in honor of Eric Keiber. Under Expenses, it was noted that invoices from Baker & Taylor (book purchases) are now being received and paid. Cress moved acceptance of the report. Allen seconded. Unanimous approval.
- VII. Statistics Report: Circulation numbers were low for February due to the short month and the early shutdown of in-person services due to COVID diagnosis and staffing constraints. We especially see this downturn in the circulation of juvenile literature. There are suggestions that usage is increasing, however. Mango Languages continues to see significant usage. There was a good turnout for Sit-n-Stitch. Information was reviewed concerning website usage and social media analytics.

VIII. Director's Report

- A. Lauren Jones is adjusting well to her role as Children's Librarian. She is currently working about ten hours a week but will move to approximately twenty hours when school concludes.
- B. Barton reported on a grant from the Hillsdale County Community Foundation. The grant provides \$379 for the creation of escape rooms. As the grant application required board approval, Allen moved approval. Cress seconded. Unanimous approval.
- C. Communication: LifeWays should begin work at the end of the month, providing support groups and clinical support to patrons on Mondays.
- D. Mackie reported on an ongoing review of financial issues related to the tenure of the previous director. He gave assurance that things currently appear in order though more information is forthcoming and review will continue.
- E. Barton's review of staffing and salary issues suggests that Saturday hours of 10 AM to 2 PM could be instituted as early as May 1st.
- F. Barton shared a brief review of the current post-pandemic rules of the Open Meetings Act.
- G. A full or partial re-keying of the building will occur at some time in the near future. Bids for the work are currently being received.

IX. New Business

- A. Budget Approval: Director reallocated some funding from book purchasing to supplies, because we get a lot of donations to cover book purchasing. There is an increase in health and life insurance expenses because the new Director is on the City insurance, and the previous Director was not. The City Manager is to increase the Trusts line in the budget to \$25,775. Allen moved to accept the budget as presented. Paladino seconded. Unanimous approval.
- B. Board Minutes: The Board agreed to post an addendum to the December 2021 minutes clarifying the nature of the "children's librarian grant" funds and how those were used. This grant is to be referred to as the Michigan HOPE Grant henceforth. Though part of the money is being utilized to pay for the salary of the children's

librarian, the grant was never to be restricted solely to that purpose. Hence, the use of excess funds to award stipends to the staff for their exemplary service in a time of transition was within the purview of the grant. The Board requested that the agenda, minutes, and packets from HLC Board meetings be uploaded to the City website. The City Manager agreed. The Library Director will provide those items to the City for upload.

X. Adjournment: The meeting was adjourned at 7:09 PM.

Hillsdale Community Library Board of Trustees Addendum to the December 2021 Meeting Minutes

All references to the children's librarian grant in these minutes are references to the Michigan HOPE Grant. Henceforth, the Board will only refer to this grant as the Michigan HOPE Grant. Under the terms of the grant, the Library has wide permission to utilize grant funds for various issues related to the operation of the Library. The most significant use of funds is related to the salary of the Children's Librarian. Some of the funds were also used (within the parameters of the grant) to fund staff stipends in recognition of the exemplary service of library staff in a time of transition and hardship. The Board of Trustees hopes that this clarification aids all in understanding the true nature of the Michigan HOPE Grant.

Hillsdale College has submitted a Right of Way permit requesting the closure of Hillsdale Street and adjacent sidewalks between Galloway Street and Barber Drive for the 2021 Commencement Ceremony as well as an alternative route closing Oak St. and E. College St. and adjacent sidewalks between Academy Lane and Union St. The closure(s) will take place beginning at 10:00 a.m. and ending at 6:00 p.m. on May 07, 2022 pursuant to TCO #2022-04 approved by Council at a regular meeting held on April 04, 2022.

The agreement has been reviewed and approved by legal counsel.

RECOMMENDATION

I recommend Council approve the agreement as presented and authorize signatures by the Mayor and Clerk.

STREET/SIDEWALK USE AGREEMENT Hillsdale College 2022 Commencement Ceremony May 07, 2022

This Agreement is made and entered between the City of Hillsdale, a Michigan municipal corporation, of Hillsdale, Michigan ("Hillsdale") and Hillsdale College, 33 E. College St., Hillsdale, Michigan 49242.

Preamble

Hillsdale controls the usage of local streets within its jurisdiction. Among other governmental functions, Hillsdale seeks to promote the use of its streets for the use and benefit of its citizens and the general public.

At various times, functions are proposed that involve the use of a portion of a public street to which Hillsdale's citizens, as well as the public at large, are invited and encouraged to attend. In such instances, when Hillsdale determines that the proposed activity will inure to the economic, cultural and general benefit of its citizens and of the community at large, it has endeavored to cooperate with the activity's sponsor/promoter. In doing so, Hillsdale is concerned with regulating the use of its streets in order to reasonably assure that they are not used in a manner that exposes persons attending activities as are allowed to take place in or on any portion of its public streets to unreasonable risks of harm, as well as to assure that no damage is done to its street facilities.

Hillsdale College desires to hold an event requiring the closure of Hillsdale Street between College Street and Barber Drive and adjacent sidewalks for the purpose of its Commencement Ceremony on Saturday, May 07, 2022 with the cleanup activities to be conducted and finalized within a specified period following the end of the event. In the event the location needs to be relocated the event will require the closure of Oak Street between E. College Street and Academy Lane.

Hillsdale College has represented that it is a responsible organization and that it has created appropriate regulations and policies by which it will regulate participants in the event it proposes to sponsor. Hillsdale College also represents that participation in its event is and will be open to all on a nondiscriminatory basis.

Hillsdale has determined that it is in its best interests and the interests of the general public to allow Hillsdale College to use the above mentioned streets as the site from which it may conduct its proposed events, and Hillsdale College has agreed to do so, all in accordance with the following terms and conditions.

Agreement

1. In consideration of and reliance on Hillsdale College's promises and its full compliance with all of the terms and conditions contained in this agreement, Hillsdale agrees to allow Hillsdale College to use the following portions of its streets and adjacent sidewalks during specified periods on May 07, 2022, for the purpose of preparing for and conducting its proposed event and related activities for the use, benefit and enjoyment of the general public during the stated hours and to thereafter restore said streets to a condition fit for public travel that is at least as good as when taken, all as hereinafter provided:

a. the closure of Hillsdale Street and adjacent sidewalks between E. College Street and Galloway and Barber Drives beginning at 10:00 a.m. and

ending at 6:00 p.m. on May 07, 2022, for the purpose of holding Hillsdale College Commencement Ceremony.

b. the closure of Oak Street and adjacent sidewalks between Academy Lane and Union Street from 10:00 a.m. until 6:00 p.m. as an alternative to the above should the location change in order to observe social distancing guidelines.

2. Hillsdale further agrees that it shall temporarily close Hillsdale Street and adjacent sidewalks between College Street and Barber Drive by Traffic Control Order 2022-04 passed by City Council on April 04, 2022 between the hours set forth for each area in subparagraph a. of paragraph 1 of this agreement. Hillsdale further agrees that it shall temporarily close Oak Street and adjacent sidewalks between E. College Street and Academy for an alternative commencement location between the hours set forth for the area in subparagraph b. of paragraph 1 of this agreement pursuant to Traffic Control Order 2022-04 passed by City Council on April 04, 2021.

3. The College shall be solely responsible for providing, erecting, maintaining, and tear down of all temporary traffic control devices (TTC) at the ends of the described portion of the above mentioned streets as shown on the attached Exhibit A, in order to close off the streets to motor vehicle traffic and the adjacent sidewalks to pedestrian traffic between 10:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m. on Saturday, May 7, 2022.

4. Hillsdale College agrees to and shall be solely responsible for obtaining, posting, and paying the fees for all applicable and necessary permits and barricade rental fees, including but not limited to those that might be required by the Federal Highway Administration, the placement of barricades, the posting of signs, as well as any rules, regulations and requirements, or other conditions that might be required by any state, county, or local statute, ordinance, rule or regulation.

5. Hillsdale College agrees that immediately following the end of the events and at its sole expense, it shall promptly remove or cause the removal of all equipment, barricades, signs, and other items pertaining to the closures. Hillsdale College shall notify the Hillsdale City Police and secure its permission to open the street(s) to vehicular traffic before removing the barricades that Hillsdale's Police Department has placed to block Hillsdale Street from the public's vehicular use. Hillsdale's barricades, when removed, shall be placed out of the main traveled portion of the street adjacent to the curbs.

6. Hillsdale College further agrees that the removal of all equipment, barricades, signs, and other items from the Hillsdale Street/Oak Street closure(s) and the surrounding affected areas, and the restoration of the entire area occupied or used by it to a swept and tidy condition shall be completed not later than noon on Monday, May 09, 2022.

7. Hillsdale College agrees to abide by all applicable statutes, ordinances, rules, and regulations pertaining to it and to all provisions of this agreement during its occupancy and use of the described portion of Hillsdale Street.

8. Hillsdale College agrees that it shall not permit any street other than the described portions of Hillsdale Street and Oak street and adjacent sidewalks to be blocked or obstructed. Further, Hillsdale College agrees to and shall confine its proposed event

activities solely to Hillsdale Street between College Street and Barber Drive or Oak Street between E. College Street and Academy Lane.

9. Hillsdale College agrees and understands that it, at its sole expense, is and shall be solely responsible for the repair and restoration of all damage to private or public property, whether real or personal, that results from or because of Hillsdale College's proposed event, and to leave the premises in a condition equal to or better than existed prior to its use, free from all garbage, trash or other items.

10. Hillsdale College represents that it is a valid Michigan corporation and further represents that it possesses or will obtain and provide persons with the skill, experience, competence, and financial ability to carry out and fulfill all of its duties and obligations under this contract in a timely and professional manner.

11. Hillsdale College further represents and covenants that it does not discriminate against any employee, applicant for employment, and shall not discriminate against any general public that will participate in the events it is staging under this agreement or any other member of the public because of race, color, religion, national origin, age, height, weight, marital status or other legally protected class. It is understood and agreed by and between the parties that breach of this covenant may be regarded as a material breach of this agreement.

12. Hillsdale College shall provide City with proof of public liability and property damage insurance with coverage that is satisfactory to Hillsdale and limits of liability of not less than a single limit of Five Hundred Thousand and 00/100 (\$500,000.00) Dollars, with the City of Hillsdale designated therein as a named insured to be and remain in force for the duration of Hillsdale College' presence on and use of Hillsdale's streets, and that such proof is to be provided at the time of execution of this Agreement.

13. Hillsdale College shall carry and provide all workers' compensation insurance coverage at its sole expense for its employees as is required by the laws of the State of Michigan and provide proof thereof to Hillsdale prior to the commencement of any activities under this contract.

14. Hillsdale College represents to Hillsdale that it intends to use the described area for the purpose of conducting Hillsdale College Commencement activities. In reliance on Hillsdale College's representations and its other promises as contained in this agreement, Hillsdale hereby grants and Hillsdale College hereby accepts the exclusive control over the described portion of Hillsdale Street and Oak street and the adjacent sidewalks and the activities therein, it being the intention of the parties that Hillsdale College is and shall be solely responsible for maintaining the described areas and regulating all activities therein so as to keep them in reasonably safe condition, free of unreasonable risk of harm, for the use and benefit of the general public and others using or within said area or any of its facilities, products or activities.

15. Hillsdale College further agrees to and shall defend, indemnify, and hold Hillsdale harmless from any and all damages, claims, demands, causes of action, lawsuits, attorney fees, and related expenses, as a result of actual or claimed personal injury, including

death, property damage, or other damage or loss of any kind or nature which are or are claimed to be a proximate result of:

a. The negligence, gross negligence or intentional acts or omissions of Hillsdale College, its agents, servants, employees, guests, vendors, invitees, event participants or event attendees which arise or are claimed to have arisen as a result or because of Hillsdale College proposed events, its associated activities and events; or

b. All such damages or injuries, including death, whether caused in part by the negligence of Hillsdale, its employees, agents, servants, or representatives; provided, however, that Hillsdale College shall not be obligated to indemnify Hillsdale for any damages or injuries, including death, caused by or resulting from the sole negligence of Hillsdale.

16. Hillsdale College agrees that any and all documents provided to Hillsdale under this agreement are subject to disclosure and hereby expressly consents to Hillsdale's reproduction and release of such documents in response to a request under the Freedom of Information Act.

17. Hillsdale College agrees that Hillsdale may immediately terminate this contract without further obligation or liability to Hillsdale College at its option and without prejudice to any other remedies to which it might be entitled, whether in law, in equity, or under this contract, by giving written notice of termination to Hillsdale College if the latter should:

- (a) be adjudged bankrupt;
- (b) become insolvent or have a receiver of its assets appointed;
- (c) make a general assignment for the benefit of creditors;
- (d) default in the performance of any obligation under this contract;
- (e) breach any covenant under this contract;

- (g) fail to perform any of its obligations to Hillsdale under this contract to Hillsdale's satisfaction.

21. The parties agree that there are no other representations, inducements, promises or agreements between them, whether oral or written.

Hillsdale and Hillsdale College further agree that in the event of legal action arising from or as a result of this Agreement or its breach, venue and jurisdiction for such action shall be in the Hillsdale County Circuit Court or in the District Court located within the County of Hillsdale, Michigan, whichever has subject matter jurisdiction over any such dispute.

#### RULES AND REGULATIONS PERMITS FOR OCCUPANCY OF AND WORK WITHIN STREET RIGHT-OF-WAYS

#### SECTION 1 - AUTHORITY

A. These rules and regulations are promulgate pursuant to the provisions of Section 30-55 of Chapter 30 of the Hillsdale Municipal Code.

#### SECTION 2 – APPLICATION PROCEDURES

- A. Applicants for permits shall complete the permit form provided by the Department of Public Services and shall return the completed form to the Public Services Building, 149 Waterworks Drive or the Clerk's Office, City Hall, 97 N. Broad Street, together with such additional information which is required pursuant to Chapter 30 of the Hillsdale Municipal Code and these rules and regulations.
- B. Each application shall be reviewed by the Director of Public Services, or his designee, for compliance with the provisions of Chapter 30 and these rules and regulations. In addition, the following persons shall receive written notification that an application has been received and they shall be provided an opportunity to review the application prior to its approval: Director of Utilities, Police Chief, Fire Chief, and City Forester.
- C. If, in the opinion of the Director of Public Services, the application complies with the applicable provisions of Chapter 30 and these rules and regulations, then he shall notify the applicant that the application has been approved. If the application fails to comply with Chapter 30 and these rules and regulations, then the Director shall notify the applicant that the application has been denied. The Director may permit the applicant to submit additional information or to revise information previously submitted so as to cause the application to comply with Chapter 30 and these rules and regulations.
- D. If an application is approved, the Director shall prepare the necessary permit and shall determine the amount of any fees which the applicant must pay. The permit and the statement of fees shall be delivered to the City Clerk.
- E. Upon payment of the fees as determined by the Director of Public Services, the City Clerk shall deliver the permit to the applicant and shall notify the Director of Public Services that the permit has been issued.

#### SECTION 3 - REQUEST TO COMMENCE WORK

- A. Any person, firm, or corporation to whom an annual blanket permit has been issued shall apply to the Director of Public Services for permission to commence work pursuant to the annual blanket permit by submitting a request to commence work on the forms provided by this purpose. Such request to commence work shall be submitted in accordance with applicable provisions of Chapter 30.
- B. Each request to commence work shall be reviewed by the Director of Public Services to determine its compliance with the provisions of Chapter 30, these rules and regulations, and the annual blanket permit. The Director shall notify the following persons and shall provide them an opportunity to comment upon the request to commence work: Director of Utilities, Police Chief, Fire Chief, and City Forester.
- C. If, in the opinion of the Director, the request to commence work is in compliance with the applicable provisions of Chapter 30, these rules and regulations, and the annual blanket permit, then he shall approve the request and notify the applicant of such approval. If the request is not in compliance, then the request shall be denied and the applicant shall have the opportunity to submit a request to commence work which is in compliance. The Director may permit the applicant to submit additional information or to revise information previously submitted so as to cause the application to comply with Chapter 30 and these rules and regulations.

#### SECTION 4 – STREET CLOSINGS AND STREET OCCUPANCIES

- A. If an application or request to commence work approved pursuant to these rules and regulations requires the closing of a street to vehicular traffic, then the applicant shall notify the Chief of Police not less than twenty-four (24) hours prior to commencing the work which will necessitate the closing of the street of the dates and times when such street is required to be closed.
- B. Streets shall be closed only pursuant to directives issued by the Chief of Police in accordance with the provisions of the Uniform Traffic Code and shall be evidenced by temporary traffic control orders and/or by the Police Chief's endorsement on the permit, or, in the case of an annual blanket permit, on the request to commence work form.
- C. The Director may issue permits for the temporary occupancy or use of portions of the street right-of-way when such occupancy or use does not significantly impair the utilization of such right-of-way for vehicular or pedestrian traffic or when such occupancy or use is for a short duration. In reviewing applications for such permits, the Director shall consider the public safety and aesthetic considerations associated with such occupancy or use as well as the public benefit which such occupancy or use provides. If such occupancy or use involves a significant restriction on vehicular traffic, other than closing, the permit, or, in the case of an annual blanket permit, the request to commence work form, shall be endorsed by the Police Chief prior to issuance.

#### SECTION 5 - STREET OPENINGS AND RIGHT-OF-WAY CONSTRUCTION

- A. It shall be the responsibility of the applicant to contact "Miss Dig" prior to commencing any construction activities within the right-of-way so that all public utilities and other facilities can be located.
- B. It shall be the responsibility of the applicant to provide all necessary warning signs, barricades, flagmen and the like in accordance with the current Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices (MUTCD) Part 6 to insure that the public is safe from injury or damage to vehicles as a result of the construction activities.
- C. The applicant, upon completion of any construction, shall restore the right-of-way areas to a condition which is as good as or better than the condition which existed prior to the commencement of construction activities.
- D. The applicant shall provide and place the necessary sheeting, shoring and bracing required to prevent caving, loss or settlement of foundation material supporting the pavement, or any other street installation such as sewers, culverts, etc. the applicant shall assume the full responsibility for this protection and shall not proceed with construction or excavation activities prior to receiving the approval of the Department of Public Services for the methods to be used. The applicant shall dispose of all surplus or unsuitable material outside of the limits of the streets.
- E. All trenches, holes and pits shall be filled with gravel, placed in successive layers not more than nine inches in depth, loose measure, and each layer shall be thoroughly compacted by mechanical tamping. Restoration shall be such that it will provide a condition equal to or better than the original condition.
- F. Street openings will be properly maintained by the applicant until the street surface is replaced.
- G. Bituminous surfaces must be replaced with bituminous materials compacted at a minimum of two lifts. Concrete surfaces must be replaced with concrete materials flush with the existing surface and properly finished.
- H. Materials used in construction, backfilling and repair operations shall comply with the State of Michigan, Department of Transportation specifications. These include the following:

  - 3. Concrete type for replacement of concrete surface....Type 35P
- I. All vegetative areas shall be restored using top soil which is free of weeds and shall be seeded and protected from erosion.
- J. Street openings shall be made in such manner and with such tools as to produce straight edges. All such openings shall be rectangular in shape unless conditions warrant an irregular shape.

#### SECTION 6 - SIDEWAI.K CONSTRUCTION. REPAIR. AND REPLACEMENT

- A. All sidewalk work shall consist of constructing the sidewalk in a single course on a prepared subgrade.
- B. All sidewalks shall project one inch above finished grade and shall slope one quarter inch per foot toward the drainage side. Sidewalks shall be four inches thick except at driveway crossings which shall be six inches thick. Sidewalks shall be a minimum of five feet wide and a maximum of six feet wide. All walks shall meet the requirements of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA).
- C. All unstable subgrade material shall be removed and replaced with a minimum of four inches granular material or sand, compacted.
- D. Forms shall be clean and straight, composed of wood or metal. The forms shall be staked to line and grade in a manner that will prevent deflection or settlement. Forms shall be oiled before placing concrete. If the line of the sidewalk conflicts with trees adjacent to the sidewalk, the applicant shall notify the City Forester and Director prior to proceeding with the installation of forms.
- E. The base shall be thoroughly wetted and the concrete deposited thereon to the proper depth. It shall be spaded along the forms compressed and struck-off flush with the top of the forms. The surface shall be floated, edges and joints properly tooled, and finished with a brush to provide a non-slip surface.
- F. The applicant shall insure the use of appropriate materials which shall comply with the following specification:
- G. Expansion joints shall be placed every fifty feet or more often if required to prevent cracking of the sidewalk. Grooved joints a minim of on-half inch in depth shall be placed every five feet.
- H. Sidewalks and sidewalk ramps shall be constructed in accordance with the standard specifications of the Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT).
- Driveway approaches shall be a minimum of ten feet in width and shall be constructed of concrete a minimum of six inches thick. Expansion joints shall be placed where the approach meets a sidewalk or street. Approaches shall be constructed in accordance with standards provided in Section 6E.

#### SECTION 7 - INSPECTIONS

- A. It shall be the responsibility of the applicant to contact the Department of Public Services at such times as inspections are required pursuant to these rules and regulations and in accordance with sound construction practices.
- B. At a minimum inspections shall be required at the following times"
  - 1. Sidewalks
    - a) After installing forms and prior to pouring concrete.
    - b)Upon completion of work and restoration of the area.
    - Street Openings

       a)Prior to commencing backfilling.

b)Prior to commencing restoration of the street surfaces.

c)Upon completion of work and restoration of the area. Other Construction

3.

- a)Upon completion of work and restoration of the area.
- b)At such other times as determined by the Director of Public Services.

#### SECTION 8 - TREES

- A. The applicant shall not remove, trim, cut roots from, or otherwise damage any tree growing within the street right-ofway without first having obtained the endorsement of the City Forester on the permit or, in the case of an annual blanket permit, on the request to commence work form.
- B. If during the course of any activities conducted pursuant to a permit granted in accordance with these rules and regulations the applicant finds that there is the possibility of interference with trees growing in the street right-of-way, the applicant shall immediately contact the Director of Public Services and the City Forester.

#### SECTION 9 - INSURANCE AND BONDS

- A. Any applicant proposing to conduct any activities involving construction within the right-of-way of streets in the City of Hillsdale shall provide evidence of liability insurance covering personal injury and property damage in the amount of not less than \$1,000,000 combined single limit. The applicant shall provide an endorsement naming the City of Hillsdale as an additional insured.
- B. The applicant shall keep such insurance in effect during all times that the applicant is conduction activities within the street right-of-ways.
- C. If the applicant is self-insured for personal injury and/or property damage risks, the applicant shall provide documentation of such self-insurance program and shall further agree to indemnify and hold the City harmless from any and all liability arising out of any activities conducted pursuant to the permit.
- D. If an applicant utilizes subcontractors in performing some or all of the work which is covered by a permit, each such subcontractor shall be required to comply with the provisions of this Section.
- E. Pursuant to the provisions of Section 30-37 of the Hillsdale Municipal Code, the Director shall determine the amount of the performance bond or cash deposit which shall be provided by the applicant prior to the issuance of the permit. In no case shall the amount of such performance bond or cash deposit required for a permit for construction activities within the traveled portion of any street be less than \$10,000.
- F. If an applicant provides a blanket bond to cover all bond requirements during a specified period of time, the amount of such bond shall be maintained at least equal to the amount required to satisfy the terms of all permits issued during that period of time.

#### SECTION 10 - FEES

A. The following schedule shall be the fees as established for permits issued pursuant to these rules and regulations:

- B. In addition to the fees indicated above, all work requiring inspections after 3:00 p.m. or on Weekends shall be subject to an additional fee of \$75.00 per hour (Minimum 2 hour charge) or portion thereof with personnel availability.
- C. Traffic control measures may incur additional fees.


# World War II Story of Edgar J. Ferguson

Hillsdale County had many young men that fought in WWII. This Memorial Day we would like to remember Edgar John Ferguson of North Adams. Edgar John was the son of E. J. and Ada (Hammill) Ferguson. He attended Hoxie School and graduated from Hillsdale High School. Edgar J. married Alma Jean Milnor in 1942. John wanted to be a pilot so while working at a tool & die factory he took flying lessons. In 1942 Lt. E. J. Ferguson answered the nation's call for pilots and spent the next year and a half learning to fly beginning with a small, single-engine "trainer aircraft. He then moved up to a 2-engine aircraft. The next step was the 4-engine B-24 Bomber with a crew of ten. Each of the crew learned their skills separately, then they learned to fly and fight as a team The crew was expected to stick together as a group right up to the end of the 50-mission combat rotation required by the U. S. Army Air Force. The crew ranged in age from about 18 to 30.

In early April 1944 Lt. Ferguson and his crew flew their plane 10,000 miles to their Theater of Operation, Guilia Field in southeastern Italy. This was the Head Quarters of the 459th Bombardment Group (Heavy) of the 304th Wing of the 15th U. S. Army Air Force. Lt. Ferguson wrote a letter home in late May where he described what it was like living at Guilia Field. They spent their time, when not flying, slogging through mud, rain, & snow to the communal latrines and showers, they huddled in their tents around a crude heater, trying to keep their uniforms presentable the whole time. "I live in a tent with a dirt floor. We have a homemade stove which is a round 5-gal. oil can with a pipe running into it from a supply tank of gasoline. Holes in the bottom for draft and some tin cans wired together for stove-pipe. I got ahold of some boards and I have some of the floor under my cot and in front of it covered over. My bed is an army cot with blankets, no sheets, no pillow, I fold up my jacket or an old dirty towel for a pillow."

Flying the B-24 Liberator for 6 to 8 hours per flight was not a cakewalk either. The bomber was designed to carry heavy payloads. The cabin space was not heated or pressurized. Oxygen

was supplied via a mask and the crew connected heaters in their flight suits to the ship's electrical power. The catwalk between the racks of 500 lb bombs was about 6 inches wide. When the bomb bay doors opened you could look 30,000 feet down to the ground.

On Friday June 9th, 1944, 1st Lt. Edgar "John" Ferguson Jr. started his day before dawn with a light breakfast and coffee. With his co-pilot and navigator, they attended a briefing on the days target. This is the 14th mission for the crew. Their regular ship, the Devastatin' Kid was in for repairs, and they were given a plane from the pool named Slightly Eager. On the way north they were joined by fighter escorts, including the 322 Fighter Group: The Tuskegee Airmen.

They crossed the Alps on the way to the target in Munich. The Slightly Eager was struggling to keep up with the first attack unit. This forced  $1^{st}$  Lt. Ferguson to drop back with the  $2^{nd}$  attack unit. Unable to keep up with them he turned back over the Alps. By this time enemy fighters were attacking the bombers. Because the Slightly Eager had left the groups of bombers it became a target for the enemy. On the first pass the Messerchmidt pilots killed 2 of the crew. Others received bullet wounds as well. Lt. Ferguson ordered his surviving crew to bail out as he and his co-pilot tried to bring the plane down for a crash-landing. The plane was attacked again, and the overhead wing fuel tanks exploded blowing the co-pilot clear of the plane. He parachuted to the ground. Lt E. J. Ferguson and the 2 dead crew members went down with the plane near the highway called Autobahn 8, at the foot of the Bavarian Alps, about 35 miles from Salzburg, Austria.

After the war several of the crew members got together and came to North Adams to visit with Lt. Ferguson's parents where they spoke of his heroism, friendship, and care for his crew.


### Local Lieutenant Missing Almost Year Listed as Killed in Action

Official notice from the War de-partment was received Thursday by Pvt. Alma J. Ferguson at Fort Ogelthorpe, Ga., that her husband, Lt. Edgar John Ferguson, 27, was killed in action over Austria, June 9, 1944. At that time the family was notified that Lt. Ferguson was missing in action, but it was not until yesterday that his death was verified. On October 3, 1942. Ferguson

Was verified. On October 3, 1942, Ferguson married Alma Jean Milnor, daugh-ter of Mr. and Mrs. George G. Milnor, of Hillsdale. The ceremony took place in the chapel of the San Antonio, Texas Aviation Cadet Center.

Center. Ferguson was an alumnus of the North Adams high school and was employed in the Richard Bro-thers defense plant in Hillsdale at the time he enlisted in the Army Air Corps. Pilot on a B-24 Bomber, Fer-guson had completed 14 missions when he was killed, and had been awarded the Distinguished Unit Badge, the highest award in the 15th A. A. F. He enlisted in the U.S. Army Air Corps in April 1942, and received basic training at Jones Field, Bonham, Tex., Sherman, Tex., Wendover Field, Utah, and at Boise, Idaho. Surviving beside the wife are his parents, Mr. and Mrs. E. J. Ferguson of North Adams, a sis-ter, Arlene Ferguson, at home, and a brother, Harold of North Adams.

# Star Laundry and the Lovejoy Family

Two children - Owen D. on February 7, 1886 and Guy F. Lovejoy on August 5, 1892 - were born to Wilford and C. and Amelia A. Lovejoy in Cedar Springs and left in 1894 to come to Camden, where the railroad was to

go. After a year they moved to 40 E. South Street in Hillsdale, where they lived for eight years.

In 1890 and 1900 the two-story part of what became the Star Laundry building was the Cottage Hotel and was used by railroad men for overnight lodging.

In 1904, Lovejoy leased the building on the corner of Manning and Carleton Road (then Railroad Street) and added wood construction for washroom, boiler and a steam engine room. Laundry equipment was also moved to 32 E. Railroad Street in 1904. Three years later he purchased the property from Lenora Abbey. In 1909, Mr. Lovejoy purchased the first dry cleaning plant in Hillsdale owned by Dick Hallock

Barry Streets. By 1924 a rug cleaning plant and garage had been built and all the buildings made fireproof. During World War I, Guy attended Business College

and located in a home on the corner of S. Howell and

he returned to Hillsdale to take over more management and improvement of the dry cleaning department. Early films share the Lovejoy family and friends using the large buildings for boat storage and other such things! On November 1, 1977, after 74 years in the same family, the Star Laundry shut down.

Just a year and a half earlier, the Sanderson Hotel, formerly the Hillsdale Hospital and before that the William Waldron home burned. After much ado - including an old building that was not to be easily destroyed the old cleaners was replaced by a nine story apartment building where it stands tall today! By Carol Lackey



# BATH IN NUDE BANNED BEFORE 8 P. M. IN CITY

Do you ever take a bath between 6 o'clock in the morning and 8 o'clock in the evening? If you do — and you are not wearing a bathing suit — you are probably breaking a Hillsdale city ordinance passed in 1879.

breaking a Hillsdale city ordinance passed in 1879. The ordinance undoubtedly will be repealed when the new compliation of city regulations is drafted, but until then, in the opinion of City Attorney Paul W. Chase, you had better don a bathing suit "which shall properly conceal the person" or wait until after 8 p. m. The city could, under the ordinance, impose a fine of from \$1 to \$5 or a sentence up to five days in the county jail for violators. Officials doubt if the ordinance will be enforced. Chase, in talking with the

Chase, in talking with the common council last night, also pointed ou? that the city prohibits business places, including factories, from operating on Sunday, under an ordinance passed in 1900. The penalty: a fine up to \$100 or a jail term up to 90 days.

BACKGROUND PROVIDED BY STAFF: Kristin Bauer, City Engineer

### **PROJECT BACKGROUND:**

The Michigan Economic Development Corporation (MEDC) on behalf of the Michigan Strategic Fund (MSF) has invited Units of General Local Governments (UGLG) to apply for its Water-Related Infrastructure (WRI) Grant. This grant is specifically noted to assist UGLGs in making necessary improvements to existing public infrastructure systems.

The City of Hillsdale is proposing application for grant funds to assist with the following infrastructure project scope of work:

The proposed project will address critical infrastructure maintenance/improvements required throughout the City of Hillsdale on the water main and sanitary sewer systems. The proposed grant project would include the following items:

*Water System: Replacement of approximately 75 (12%) of the in-line shut off valves in the water main system. This work will include the installation of new valves and removal of the failed valves.* 

Sanitary Sewer System: Replacement and/or cured-in-place lining of approximately 1.01 miles of sanitary sewer within the city.

A public hearing is required by the MEDC to adhere to the public participation provisions set forth in Title I of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, as amended and an authorizing resolution.

### **RECOMMENDATION:**

City staff recommends that City Council should set a public hearing to occur at the May 2, 2022 meeting at 7:00 pm to review the grant documents and consider supporting submittal of the grant application via an authorizing resolution.

#### SUBJECT: Ordinance Amendment - Set Public Hearing

#### **BACKGROUND: Jake Hammel, DPS Director**

Dogs in city cemeteries has been an ongoing concern for some time now. Owners use the cemeteries as dog runs, allowing their pets to run unleashed throughout the premises. Ordinance No. 2017-01 is currently in place allowing animals as long as they are leashed/controlled and also limiting them to the roadways within. The ordinance has consistently been ignored. As expected, animals are relieving themselves on head stones and various other places within the cemeteries whether leashed or unleashed. Not only is this very disrespectful to the deceased, but their families as well. In an attempt to remedy the situation, the Cemetery Board has requested the City Attorney draft an amended ordinance prohibiting all animals from being in the cemeteries. The ordinance is attached for review and adoption after a public hearing is held.

#### RECOMMENDATION

I recommend Council set a public hearing for May 16, 2022 to receive public input.

#### AMENDMENT TO ORDINANCE NO. 2017-01

## AMENDMENT TO AN ORDINANCE No. 2017-01 TO PROHIBIT PERSONS FROM BRINGING OR MAINTAINING ANIMALS WITHIN CEMETERIES OWNED OR CONTROLLED BY THE CITY OF HILLSDALE, MICHIGAN.

WHEREAS the City of Hillsdale Ordinance 2017-01 sets forth rules regarding conduct within, and the use of the grounds of, cemeteries owned or controlled by the City of Hillsdale; and

WHEREAS the Hillsdale City Council has determined, at the recommendation of the City of Hillsdale Cemetery Board, that it would be in the best interest of the City and the citizens thereof if persons were prohibited from bringing to, possessing, or leading any animal, fowl, or reptile, whether leashed or not, on the grounds of any cemetery owned or controlled by the City of Hillsdale, Michigan in order to maintain the sanctity and peace at such cemeteries

#### NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY OF HILLSDALE ORDAINS THAT:

CITY OF HILLSDALE, MICHIGAN ORDINANCE NO. 2017-01 shall be amended as follows:

Sec. 10-10.- Conduct on cemetery grounds.

• • •

7. No person shall bring to, possess, permit, or lead any animal, fowl, or reptile, whether leashed or not, on the grounds of any cemetery owned or controlled by the City of Hillsdale, Michigan, provided however, that this prohibition shall not apply to or prohibit the use of trained guide dogs, hearing dogs, signal dogs, mobility assistance dogs, seizure or medical alert dogs, psychiatric service dogs, or other dogs or animals trained to provide assistance to persons with disabilities. The Cemetery rules and Regulations shall be amended to reflect the prohibition contained herein.

# BACKGROUND PROVIDED BY STAFF (Kimberly Thomas, Assessor)

Michigan's Public Act 660 of 2018, the Property Assessing Reform Act, amended the General Property Tax Act (GPTA), 1893 PA 206, to add audit procedures and minimum specific requirements for local governmental units and assessors. One of the requirements added was for each assessing district to "have and follow a published policy under which its assessor's office reasonably accessible to taxpayers." The State Tax Commission is required under the act to audit each assessing district. As part of the audit they will verify that this and other required policies are in place and being followed.

Assessing department staff drafted the attached resolution for the purpose of establishing a formal written policy in compliance with this part of the act and other related requirements. Nothing in this policy changes how the City Assessor and the assessing department have been conducting business. Instead, this is just adoption of a formal policy specifying that these practices should continue for the benefit of the taxpayers.

# **RECOMMENDATION:**

Council should carefully review the resolution language presented, and:

- 1. Pass the resolution to adopt the policy as presented; or
- 2. Amend the resolution to adopt alternative policies, paying attention to the requirements contained within the statute; or
- 3. Table the matter and refer the resolution back to the Assessor with recommended changes for consideration at the next regular meeting.

### RESOLUTION TO ESTABLISH A POLICY REGARDING THE ACCESSIBILITY OF THE CITY OF HILLSDALE ASSESSOR'S OFFICE TO THE CITY TAXPAYERS PUBLIC ACT 660 OF 2018

Adopted: _____, 2022

At a regular meeting, properly noticed, of the City Council of the City of Hillsdale, Hillsdale County, Michigan held in the City Hall Council Chambers, 97 North Broad Street, Hillsdale, Michigan at 7:00 p.m.

**WHEREAS** Public Act 660 of 2018 was approved by Governor Snyder on December 28, 2018 amending Michigan's General Property Tax Act (GPTA), Act 206 of 1893, to provide a statutory framework to guarantee the highest quality assessments for taxpayers as well as local units; and

**WHEREAS** the Act defines the requirements for substantial compliance with the GPTA, provides timelines for audits and follow-up audits, and details a process for bringing a local unit into compliance if they remain non-compliant after a follow-up review; and

**WHEREAS** local units are required to ensure that certain requirements are being met beginning in the 2022 tax year.

**THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED** that the City of Hillsdale establishes the following policy and provides the following information in connection with the City Assessor's office:

- 1. PURPOSE to create, publish, and retain "substantial compliance" with State Tax Commission guidelines and the GPTA.
- 2. SCOPE This policy shall be followed by all officials and employees of the City Assessor's office.
- 3. POLICY
  - 3.1 All property assessment rolls and property appraisal cards shall be available for inspection and copying in the City Assessor's office during the customary business hours.
    - i. The City Assessor's office is located on the 2nd floor of City Hall, 97 North Broad Street, Hillsdale, Michigan 49242.
    - ii. Customary business hours are Monday thru Friday, 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.
    - iii. The above-listed hours are subject to closure for observed holidays and may change without notice with prior approval from the City Manager and/or City Council.
    - iv. Reasonable effort will be made to post any closures or changes to office hours on the City's website, <u>www.cityofhillsdale.org</u>, and/or the City's Facebook page, <u>https://www.facebook.com/CityofHillsdale</u>.
    - v. Taxpayers may annually request one copy of the property appraisal card at no charge for property that they own or for which they are responsible for payment of the taxes;
    - vi. Additional copies, copies of appraisal cards for which the persons requesting are not the taxpayer, assessment roll copies, and any other records requested in any format shall be provided subject to the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) policy and published fee schedule on file with the City Clerk.
    - vii. Property appraisal cards for the current tax year shall also be available on the internet at <u>www.bsaonline.com</u>.
    - viii. The assessor shall also make available current year land value studies, economic condition factor (ECF) studies, and the assessment roll certified by the board of review at their March meeting online at <a href="http://www.cityofhillsdale.org/cityassessor">www.cityofhillsdale.org/cityassessor</a>.

- 3.2 The City Assessor's office shall be reasonably accessible to taxpayers during the above-listed customary business hours.

  - iv. Requests for inspection and/or production of records maintained by the the assessor's office should be made by contacting the designated individual(s) listed above or by submitted a written request in compliance with the City's FOIA policy.
  - v. Taxpayer requests for informal hearing and assessment dispute resolution:
    - a. Taxpayers may contact the designated individual(s) listed above to request an informal hearing for review of the current year assessment prior to the first Monday in March.
      - i. The informal hearing may include submission of documentation by the taxpayer, or physical inspection of the property by the assessor or the assessor's designee to verify any claims made by the taxpayer.
      - ii. Any changes made by the assessor or the assessor's designee as a result of this informal review shall be verified by issuance of an amended form L-4400, *Notice of Assessment, Taxable Valuation, and Property Classification* clearly marked "REVISED," dated, and initialed by the individual making the change.
    - b. Taxpayers may also submit documentation or request a physical inspection and inperson review of their property at any time following adjournment of the March meeting of the board of review.
      - i. Changes made as a result of this review will be shown on the following year property appraisal card.
      - ii. Taxpayers may submit a written request to the board of review prior to their December meeting if they believe that the information contained in the current and/or prior year property appraisal card contains qualified errors subject to correction under MCL 211.53b.

### **PROJECT BACKGROUND:**

The United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) through the Rural Business Development Grant (RBDG) program awarded grant funds to the city for improvements to Uran Street from Arch Drive to Industrial Drive. SUBJECT: Adoption of a Community Development Plan

# **BACKGROUND PROVIDED BY STAFF**

Each CDBG application requires the adoption of a Community Development Plan that addresses community development and housing needs in accordance with the provisions set forth in Title 1 of the federal Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, as amended. The adopted plan must include:

1. A statement assessing the needs and problems of the community, including the needs of low and moderate income persons. In all applications, the assessment must address both overall community development and housing needs regardless of the category under which funding is requested.

2. A summary of possible long-term activities (two years or more) to address the identified needs and problems.

3. A summary of contemplated Short-term activities (one to two years) to address the identified needs and problems.

4. A description of the effect the proposed CDBG project will have on the community.

5. A plan for minimizing the displacement of persons as a result of grant assisted activities and to assist persons actually displaced by such activities.

This is the same Community Development Plan that was adopted on Adopted August 20, 2018 in preparation for the Dawn Theater Blight Elimination Grant application, with modifications for the Water-Related Infrastructure grant application May 17, 2021 and April 18, 2022.

## **RECOMMENDATION:**

Staff recommends that Council adopt the Community Development Plan as modified and authorize submission with the CDBG grant application for Water-Related Infrastructure for utility projects to include *Water System: Replacement of approximately 75 (12%) of the inline shut off valves in the water main system. This work will include the installation of new valves and removal of the failed valves. Sanitary Sewer System: Replacement and/or cured-in-place lining of approximately 1.40 miles of sanitary sewer within the city.*

# Community Development Plan Adopted May 17, 2021

This is a summary of the Community Development Plan within the City of Hillsdale Master Plan adopted July 31, 2021. Unless otherwise noted, information provided can be found on the indicated page of the 2021 Master Plan.

## SUMMARY

From 2015 to 2018, the City of Hillsdale participated in Governor Snyder's Project Rising Tide (PRT) initiative. Hillsdale was chosen as the Region 9 Community based on having a higher poverty rate and lower building occupancy rate than the state.

Several focus groups and public meetings were held during the Project Rising Tide process. S.W.O.T. analyses indicate that citizens perceive Hillsdale's Historic Downtown as a Strength, but that some of Hillsdale's weaknesses include blight, a lack of community pride, a lack of nightlife, a lack of entertainment for teens, along with empty store fronts. Opportunities suggested the elimination of blight along with leveraging recreational and cultural assets. Perceived threats included a decline in employment opportunities for unskilled labor.

### NEEDS AND PROBLEMS

Background research for the Hillsdale's 2021 Master Plan indicated that the City's **median household income of \$30,968** is lower in the City than in the County (\$48,392), the state or the nation. Overall, 19.8% of City households make less than \$15,000 a year (26). While well-paying jobs are needed, **over 12.5% of City residents do not have a high school diploma** (19). So, there is still a need for low skilled employment opportunities, skills training and improved general education.

In 2014, the Average Taxable Value for a principal residence in the City of Hillsdale was \$34,069 with an estimated annual tax bill of \$1,220. Slow housing growth has created a great need for renovations as a number of issues and problems, such as blight, are associated with an **aging housing stock**. Along with the maintenance needs of aging housing structures, there comes increased maintenance of **aging infrastructure** to support housing such as **water lines, sanitary sewers and roads**.

A significant portion (57.3%) of the city's **housing stock was built prior to 1960** (32) Housing stock built before 1960 will be at an age where major renovations may be necessary. In many cases, occupants of this housing stock are the original owners who are now elderly, often on fixed incomes and are financially incapable of making necessary repairs. Others have been sold to first time buyers who are usually young and lack financial resources to make major structural repairs. The existing housing stock is in a state of decline.

In general, the older a structure is, the more likely the need for major repairs and improvements to make to make it marketable. Because major repairs and improvements are often very costly, older housing is at greater risk of decline. If this issue is ignored, structures may decline to the point that they are converted to multiple units or even need to be demolished, thereby contributing to the blight of a neighborhood.

The City needs new residential developments of all types. There is a need for more senior residential developments in the City. Certain residential properties and areas of the City continue to lack proper maintenance which threatens property values of surrounding properties and neighborhoods.

Jobs created by commercial and industrial land users make possible the survival of a community as dollars generated from employment filter down through the local economy. However, industrial land use has declined relative to residential land use. **Vacant industrial structures** that become available outside the industrial park will be encouraged to be reused for an industrial purpose whenever feasible. When it is not feasible for these structures to be reused for an industrial purpose, adaptive reuse to another use or multiple uses will be considered for review as a mixed development. Reuse of a vacant industrial structures or land must be made compatible in design and character with the surrounding land uses.

**Central Business Districts** (CBD) across the country have experienced serious difficulties remaining viable. In some areas of Hillsdale's CBD, businesses are economically marginal. Many businesses are not capable of providing the consumer one-stop–shopping which is available from competitors along the M-99 commercial strip.

The older age of the Central Business District structures along with the capital required to renovate these properties make it difficult for the building owner to rehabilitate a structure inside and out. Consequently, some buildings will decline until a profitable venture comes along in the future with a plan to efficiently utilize available space or the structure continues to decline until it becomes unsafe and is torn down. Probably the most critical issue facing the CBD is the lack of a use of second and third floors.

## III. Short Term Goals

# **A. CITYWIDE ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT**

a. Commercial Development: Encourage the development of commercial uses to support the needs of the City of Hillsdale and the surrounding area, providing convenient shopping and related services to area residents and assuring compatibility of commercial areas with residential and other areas.

## 1. Goals

- (1) Encourage clustered commercial development rather than 'sprawl' or strip development.
- (2) Locate commercial establishments for access to efficient transportation systems and for the convenience of residents.
- (3) Locate commercial uses to avoid incompatible adjacent uses.
- (4) Encourage diversification in the type of commercial and business establishments in order to meet a greater range of citizen needs.
- (5) Develop commercial businesses that enable residents to spend locally.
- (6) Preserve the architectural integrity of older commercial areas as they are redeveloped and restored.

# 2. Action Steps

- (1) Utilize current tools to ensure greater green space and better landscaping.
- (2) Review zoning ordinance safeguards to minimize the negative impacts of commercial activities on roads, adjacent land uses, and the environment.
- (3) Evaluate the expansion of Form-Based Zoning ordinances in commercial areas

- (4) Industrial Development: Foster industrial development and redevelopment, with emphasis on the development of light, clean industry that will diversify the local economy, strengthen the City tax base, and protect the local environment from degradation.

  - (8) Encourage industrial development in areas where soils are suitable, minimizing potential for groundwater contamination; favor uses that do not pollute the air, soil, water, or compromise the quality of life of residents; this includes appropriate buffering, including landscaping, of each new or expanding site.
  - (9) Promote and find technology-based companies, especially data storage.

### · Vibrant M-99 Corridor Businesses

- 1. Goals
  - (1) Encourage walkability and limit the number of automobile access points in M-99 redevelopment projects.
  - (2) Encourage a uniform streetscape and the development of attractive gateways to the community.
  - (3) Extend and develop pedestrian and bike paths
  - (4) Extend and develop pedestrian and bike paths

### Prosperous Industrial Park

### a. Goals

- (1) Encourage commercial/residential, mixed-use redevelopment of abandoned industrial sites outside of industrial parks.

- (3) Encourage the development of light, clean industry clustered in industrial parks that will diversify the local economy, provide a stable tax base and will protect the local environment from degradation
- (4) Redevelop existing abandoned industrial sites.
- (5) Allow light industrial uses that provide economic benefit to the community and that do not result in negative consequences to bordering neighborhoods.
- (6) Provide high-quality business locations with existing essential infrastructure
- (7) Increase local employment opportunities
- (8) Assure industrial uses have access to major thoroughfares and do not disrupt secondary and tertiary roadways.
- (9) Encourage industrial development in areas where soils are suitable and potential for groundwater contamination is minimized.

### c. Downtown Revitalization

- (4) Encourage redevelopment and use of second and third floors of buildings to include residential and other uses
- (5) Concentrate on redevelopment and restoration of existing commercial areas rather than promoting new commercial development in fringe or strip areas.
- (6) Preserve the historic character of the downtown business district centered on a historic theme and architectural style most common in the area.
- (7) Enhance the unique qualities of the downtown business district by creating flexibility in zoning and land use.
- (8) Encourage the redevelopment and use of second and third floor buildings in the downtown business district to include residential and other uses.
- (9) Support continued rehabilitation of the Hillsdale
- (10) County offices and the Post office within the downtown business district.
- (11) Support the downtown business district property owners with assistance for the review and improvement of the building façades.
- (12) Encourage alternate forms of transportation
- (13) Develop resources for electric vehicles

### b. Action Steps

- (1) Amend Parking Ordinance to allow more on-street overnight parking
- (2) Create bike lanes along major streets.
- (3) Install bike racks in highly visible areas
- (4) Continue and promote the TIFA façade program and restoration grants (TIFA Board)
- (5) Enforce existing code (City Code Enforcement Office)
- (6) Seek programs and grants for Blight Removal
- (7) Encourage non-profit involvement especially the arts

# **C.** NEIGHBORHOOD REVITALIZATION:

The City of Hillsdale features a high percentage of older stock, most of it well worth preserving and rehabilitating in order to enhance the quality of life of residents and increase property values.

## a. Goals

- 1. Support neighborhood revitalization
- 2. Encourage a variety of new residential development that will assure safe and sanitary housing to meet the needs of existing and future residents
- 3. Provide affordable housing for working families and senior residents

# b. Action Steps

- 1. Adoption of form-based code and historic preservation tools.
- 2. Consider zoning changes that better manage multi-family housing and work to preserve single-family housing where appropriate.
- 3. Analyze & Recommend Neighborhoods for future Neighborhood Enterprise Zone (NEZ)
- 4. Zone for appropriate mixed-use in residential neighborhoods that encourages redevelopment, walkability and small business development.
- 5. Locate new residential development in areas where potential conflicts with incompatible land uses can be avoided.
- 6. Amend ordinances that allow for variable density of residential uses to be mixed with commercial uses.
- 7. Creation of Local Historic Districts
- 8. Increase Neighborhood involvement through competition
- 9. Research Adopt-A-Neighborhood and implement with non-profits
- 10. Seek programs and grants for Blight Removal
- 11. Create neighborhood pocket parks or gardens on empty lots
- 12. Neighborhood Enterprise Zones (NEZ)
- 13. Market Hillsdale as a great place to live

### **D.** DEVELOP EXISTING WATER AND WATERWAY ACCESS

- a. Study potential hazards, water quality and natural features of the St. Joseph River
  - 1. Remove dam and drain Millpond
  - 2. Organize annual cleanup of trash
  - 3. Clear riverbanks of brush, invasive plants and fallen trees
- b. Evaluate existing, select parks as potential nature preserves
- c. Expand amenities in Waterworks, Owens and Sandy Beach parks
  - 1. Plant large, native species trees
  - 2. Build new indoor/outdoor facility for gatherings in Owens park
  - 3. Build storage facilities for dock renters in Owens or Sandy Beach parks
  - 4. Replace existing boat launch in Waterworks park
  - 5. Install new breakwater along park road

### **E.** IMPROVE UTILITIES

- a. Evaluate and upgrade Electric, Water and Wastewater infrastructure
- b. Improve Storm Water control
  - 1. Create storm water ordinance
  - 2. Replace or install new storm water infrastructure in conjunction with other projects

### EFFECT OF PROPOSED CDBG PROJECT

The project area is city-wide and includes neighborhoods of low to moderate income households with the benefit of the projects impacting the entire City of Hillsdale through improved reliability of the water distribution and sanitary sewer collection systems.

The City of Hillsdale proposes to request up to \$2,000,000 in CDBG funds to address critical infrastructure maintenance/improvements required throughout the city on the water main and sanitary sewer systems. The proposed grant project would include the following items:

Water System: Replacement of approximately 75 (12%) of the in-line shut off valves in the water main system. This work will include the installation of new valves and removal of the failed valves.

Sanitary Sewer System: Replacement and/or cured-in-place lining of approximately 1.40 miles of sanitary sewer within the city.

# ANTI-DISPLACEMENT AND RELOCATION ASSISTANCE PLAN

# **Minimize Displacement**

Consistent with the goals and objectives of activities assisted under the Act, the City of Hillsdale will take the following steps to minimize the displacement of persons from their homes:

- Coordinate code enforcement with rehabilitation and housing assistance programs.
- Evaluate housing codes and rehabilitation standards in reinvestment areas to prevent their placing undue financial burden on long-established owners or tenants of multi-family buildings.
- Stage rehabilitation of apartment units to allow tenants to remain during and after rehabilitation by working with empty units or buildings first.
- Establish facilities to house persons who must be relocated temporarily during rehabilitation.
- Adopt public policies to identify and mitigate displacement resulting from intensive public investment in neighborhoods.
- Adopt policies which provide reasonable protections for tenants faced with conversion to a condominium or cooperative.
- Adopt tax assessment policies such as deferred tax payment plans to reduce impact or rapidly increasing assessments on low income owner occupants or tenants in revitalizing areas.
- Establish counseling centers to provide homeowners and renters with information on the assistance available to help them remain in their neighborhood in the face of revitalization pressures.

## **Relocation Assistance to Displaced Persons**

The City of Hillsdale will provide relocation assistance for lower-income tenants who, in connection with an activity assisted under the CDBG Program, move permanently or move personal property from real property as a direct result of the demolition of any dwelling unit or the conversion of a lower-income dwelling unit in accordance with the requirements of 24 CFR 42.350. A displaced person who is not a lower-income tenant, will be provided relocation assistance in accordance with the Uniform Relocation Assistance and Real Property Acquisition Policies Act of 1970, as amended, and implementing regulations at 49 CFR Part 24.
